

Occupational Therapy M.O.T.

Program Description

Occupational therapists work with individuals who may be

- recovering from illnesses or injuries,
- contending with developmental disabilities, or
- coping with changes resulting from the aging process.

Occupational therapists advance the person's well-being by promoting adaptation and independence through meaningful activities of everyday living to enhance and restore health. By preventing, reducing, or overcoming physical, social, and emotional impairments in people, occupational therapists help to restore and sustain the highest quality of productive life to persons of all ages.

The program is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Occupational Therapy Education (ACOTE) of the American Occupational Therapy Association (AOTA), located at 4720 Montgomery Lane, PO Box 31220, Bethesda, MD 20824-1220; 301-652-AOTA; aota.org. Although education programs continue to be accredited at the BS level through 2006, the OUHSC program has been accredited at the master's entry level since the fall of 1999.

Graduates are eligible to take the national certification examination administered by the National Board for Certification in Occupational Therapy (NBCOT). After successful completion of this examination, the individual will be an Occupational Therapist, Registered (OTR). Most states require licensure to practice; however, state licenses are usually based on the results of the NBCOT Certification Examination. A felony conviction may not only affect a student's ability to attend certain clinical sites for clinical education and fieldwork, it may also affect a graduate's ability to sit for the certification examination or obtain state licensure.

The Master of Occupational Therapy professional program consists of 80 semester hours of sequenced and integrated didactic and clinical courses including 26 weeks of fieldwork to be completed in no more than five years.

Admission Requirements

The OUHSC Master of Occupational Therapy has joined the Centralized Application Service for Occupational Therapy (OTCAS). Applicants must complete both the OTCAS application and the OUHSC application. To be considered for admission, an applicant must:

- have completed a baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university, or complete requirements to be eligible to earn the B.S. in Health Studies degree after completion of 30 hours in the program; **NOTE: Effective for 2019 admission, a bachelor's degree must be earned prior to enrollment in the program.**
- have successfully completed, or be in the process of completing, prerequisite course work (90 credit hours – no more than 60 credit hours from a two-year college will count toward the required 90) plus 10 hours of upper division coursework from any accredited college or university, prior to starting the program;
- be in good standing with the college or university last or currently attending;
- have a minimum grade point average of 2.75 on a 4.0 scale for each grade point average in all college work and natural science courses attempted. *The College of Allied Health does not recognize academic forgiveness nor reprieve policies. All attempts of a course are included in the calculation of GPAs;*
- have completed all prerequisite courses with grades of C or better;
- document 40 hours of observation experience;
- take the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) General Test. The OTCAS GRE Designated Institution Code for the MOT program at OUHSC is 7448. GRE's web address is gre.org; and earn a minimum score of 600 (paper-based) or 100 (internet-based) within two years prior to application on the Test of English as a Foreign

Language (TOEFL) if English is the second language. TOEFL's web address is toefl.org.

Admission Prerequisites

Prerequisite courses are offered at most colleges and universities. Check the Transfer Equivalencies Database on the College of Allied Health web page (alliedhealth.ouhsc.edu) or your school advisor regarding equivalent courses.

- 2 Foreign Language: 2 years in high school or 2 semesters in college (same language)

- Human Physiology (4 hrs)
- 3 Introduction to Computers (3 hrs)
- Intro to Personality or Abnormal Psychology (3 hrs)
- Intro to Zoology or Concepts in Biology (4-5 hrs)
- Medical Vocabulary (2-3 hrs)
- Natural Science Elective (3 courses)
- 2 Non-western Culture (3 hrs)
- Physics I (4 hrs)
- 2 Principles of English Composition I (3 hrs)
- 2 Principles of English Composition II (3 hrs)
- 2 U. S. History (3 hrs)
- 2 Understanding Artistic Forms (3 hrs)
- 4 Understanding Statistics (3 hrs)
- 1 Upper Level Gen Ed Course (3 hrs)
- 2 Western Civilization & Culture (3 hrs)

Note: Maximum number of credit hours accepted from a two-year college is 60. **At least 10 credit hours of upper division coursework must also be completed prior to entering the program.**

- 1** is required if applicant has not completed a Bachelor's degree. Recommended that the applicant take an upper level/division (3000 or 4000 level) non-western culture, western civilization & culture, or understanding art forms class. By taking an upper division course in one of those categories, two prerequisites can be completed with that one class.
- 2** not required for applicants who have an Associate of Science or Associate of Arts degree from an Oklahoma college, or for applicants who have a Bachelor's degree. Foreign Language requirement is waived for applicants who completed two years in the same foreign language in high school.
- 3** not required for applicants who have an Associate of Science, Associate of Arts degree, or higher.

Otherwise complete a computer course, pass an institution assessment, or substitute 1 year of high school computer courses (excluding keyboarding). **4** It is recommended that the applicant take an equivalent course to OU course number PSY 2003. If there is not an equivalent course at your college/university for PSY 2003, it is acceptable to take an equivalent course to OU's course numbers PSY 2113, COMM 2513, or ECON 2843.

Application Procedure

1. By **February 1** of the year in which admission is sought, follow the step-by-step process for successful application:

2. A letter of acceptance, alternate status, or denial to the program will be posted the latter part of April.
3. The applicant must accept the position within two weeks of notification.
4. Students accepted must confirm by paying a non-refundable deposit on enrollment. The deposit is applied toward tuition and fees during the first term.
